VALE - LTGEN HENRY JOHN COATES AC, MBE

A TRIBUTE TO A RAAC SOLDIER, SCHOLAR, HISTORIAN AND GENTLEMAN

Lieutenant-General Henry John Coates AC MBE

Born: 28 December 1932, Adelaide

Died: 11 June 2018, Canberra (Queens Birthday)

John was educated at Ipswich Grammar School for nine years where he was a distinguished scholar, sportsman and cadet matriculating in 1951, entering the Royal Military College (RMC) in February 1952, just as Princess Elizabeth became our Queen.

After graduation he was allocated to the Royal Australian Armoured Corps (RAAC) and was posted in 1956 to First Armoured Regiment (1AR), Puckapunyal, Victoria, which was equipped with Centurion tanks. Later that year the Regiment deployed to Melbourne to support the running of the Olympic Games. John was in command of the Regimental Guard at the Olympic Village, Heidelberg where he charmed the female athletes and given the name "Dreamboat" published in Pix that year - much to his chagrin. The following year he was married to Diana Begg of Adelaide while there and in due course they had three children. His brother officers drove across from Pucka to support him.

He was then posted as Adjutant to the 10th Light Horse Regiment (CMF) in Western Australia, during which time he studied and gained his first university degree. In 1963 he became a lecturer in Military History at RMC where he began a thesis on the Malayan Emergency, published later in 1974. It began his lifelong interest in Military History with notable publications to follow.

He now travelled to Europe with his family to take up a posting as a squadron commander with the Royal Scots Greys in the British Army on the Rhine. The Royal Scots Greys was one of the UK's aristocratic regiments, and John was to serve with distinction in it, making lifelong friends.

Back in Australia John attended Staff College at Queenscliff, Victoria before taking command of "B" Squadron 3rd Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam in 1970. He served with distinction in Vietnam, including time as Brigade Major of 1st Australian Task Force at Nui Dat, Phuoc Tuy Province. He led a composite reaction force to support 7th battalion Royal Australian Regiment relieve Xuyen Moc, a remote village in the North of the province being attacked by elements

of the Viet Cong's D 445 battalion. Lt Col Ron Grey, CO of 7Bn remarked he thought "*Coates' action in personally taking the lead armoured personnel carrier into the village at full throttle was inspirational and an extraordinary feat of personal valour.*"

After Vietnam he returned to Duntroon as Commanding Officer of the Corps of Staff Cadets and began the process of implementing the changes following the Fox Report of April 1970. A decade later he returned as commandant and found that some of the bad practices of "hazing" still existed. He systematically set about removing them and leaving Duntroon a better place.

1978-79 he was attached to the US Army's Armoured Training Centre at Fort Hood. He returned to Sydney on promotion to Colonel. 1981 John attended the Royal College of Defence Studies in the UK, and in 1984 he was appointed head of the Australian Defence Staff in Washington.

In 1987 he was head of defence policy development at Army Headquarters, Canberra before taking command of the Army as Chief of the General Staff (CGS) in 1990, and now a Lieutenant General. While CGS he worked to continue developing links with the armies of Pacific Nations and at his invitation, General Sudrajat, was the first chief of the Indonesian Army to attend the annual CGS Exercise.

John was made a Companion of the Order of Australia before his retirement in 1992. He now had time to pursue his academic interests and became associated with the Department of History at ADFA, the Australian Defence Force Academy (UNSW) Canberra.

There are several works to his credit, but his masterpiece was "*An Atlas of Australia's Wars*" first published in 2001 by Oxford University Press. "Atlas" was an enormous undertaking involving countless hours with the cartographer researching and writing the essays to accompany the maps. He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate.

Professor Peter Dennis of ADFA said that John "*was both a productive scholar and an engaging colleague truly exemplifying the idea of a 'soldier/scholar'*". In words every Duntroon graduate will remember so well John was "*a gallant and erudite soldier*".
